Carbone, Elisa Lynn. [Blood on the river: James Town 1607](#). New York: Viking, 2006.

Traveling to the New World in 1606 as the page to Captain John Smith, twelve-year-old orphan Samuel Collier settles in the new colony of James Town, where he must quickly learn to distinguish between friend and foe.

Cooper, James Fenimore. [The last of the Mohicans](#). New York: Atheneum Books for Young Readers, 1986. [j] RL 10.3*

This classic portrays a man of moral courage who severs all connections with a society whose values he can no longer accept.

Curry, Jane Louise. [A stolen life](#). New York: McElderry Books, 1999. [j] RL 5.9*

In 1758 in Scotland, teenaged Jamesina MacKensie finds her courage and resolution severely tested when she is abducted by "spirifers" and, after a harrowing voyage, sold as a bond slave to a Virginia planter.

Fraustino, Lisa Rowe. [I walk in dread: The diary of Deliverance Trembley, witness to the Salem witch trials](#). New York: Scholastic, 2004. [j FRAUSTINO] Lexile 910*

Twelve-year-old Deliverance Trembley writes in her diary about the fears and doubts that arise during the 1692 witch hunt and trials in Salem Village, Massachusetts, especially when her pious friend, Goody Corey, is condemned as a witch.

Kudlinski, Kathleen V. [My Lady, Pocahontas](#). Tarrytown, NY: Marshall Cavendish, 2006.

Nuttawgon, daughter of a minor Pamunkey chief, is still a girl when Pocahontas's vision of peace between their people and the newly arrived English colonists bonds the two in a lifelong friendship as they work together to make the vision a reality.

O'Dell, Scott. [The serpent never sleeps: A novel of Jamestown and Pocahontas](#). Boston: Houghton Mifflin, 1987. [j] Lexile 880*

In the early seventeenth century, Serena Lynn, determined to be with the man she has loved since childhood, travels to the New World and comes to know the hardships of colonial life and the extraordinary Princess Pocahontas.

- Osborne, Mary Pope. [Standing in the light: The captive diary of Catharine Carey Logan](#). New York: Scholastic, 1998. [j] RL 5.1*
A Quaker girl's diary reflects her experiences growing up in the Delaware River Valley of Pennsylvania and her capture by Lenape Indians in 1763.
- Rees, Celia. [Sorceress](#). Cambridge, MA: Candlewick Press, 2001. [y] RL 5.6*
Eighteen-year-old Agnes, a Mohawk Indian who is descended from a line of shamanic healers, uses her own newly-discovered powers to uncover the story of her ancestor, a seventeenth-century New England English healer who fled charges of witchcraft to make her life with the local Indians.
- Rees, Celia. [Witch child](#). Cambridge, MA: Candlewick Press, 2001. [y] RL 6.0*
In 1659, fourteen-year-old Mary Newbury keeps a journal of her voyage from England to the New World and her experiences living as a witch in a community of Puritans near Salem, Massachusetts.
- Rinaldi, Ann. [A break with charity: A story about the Salem witch trials](#). San Diego: Harcourt Brace Jovanovich, 1992. RL 4.9*
While waiting for a church meeting in 1706, Susanna English, daughter of a wealthy Salem merchant, recalls the malice, fear, and accusations of witchcraft that tore her village apart in 1692.
- Rosenburg, John M. [First in peace: George Washington, the Constitution, and the presidency](#). Brookfield, Conn: Millbrook Press, 1998. [j] RL 9.1*
A fictionalized biography of the first president of the newly formed United States, George Washington, from his involvement in the Constitutional Convention in 1787, through his two terms as president, up to his death in 1799.
- Rosenburg, John M. [Young George Washington: The making of a hero](#). Brookfield, CT: Millbrook Press, 1997. [j] RL 7.0*
A fictionalized biography, with emphasis on the early life, of the Virginia farmer's son who would eventually become a Revolutionary War leader and first President of the United States.
- Speare, Elizabeth George. [The witch of Blackbird Pond](#). Boston: Houghton Mifflin, 2001. [j] RL 5.7*
In 1687 in Connecticut, Kit Tyler, feeling out of place in the Puritan household of her aunt, befriends an old woman considered a witch by the community and suddenly finds herself standing trial for witchcraft.
- Schwabach, Karen. [A pickpocket's tale](#). New York: Random House, 2006. [j SCHWABACH]. RL 5.1*
When Molly, a ten-year-old orphan, is arrested for picking pockets in London in 1731, she is banished to America and serves as an indentured servant for a New York City family that expects her to follow their Jewish traditions.

Revolutionary War

- Anderson, M.T. [The astonishing life of Octavian Nothing, traitor to the nation. Volume one: The pox party.](#) Cambridge, Mass.: Candlewick Press, 2006. [y ANDERSON] Lexile 1090*
Various diaries, letters, and other manuscripts chronicle the experiences of Octavian, a young African American, from birth to age sixteen, as he is brought up as part of a science experiment in the years leading up to and during the Revolutionary War. [Volume two: The kingdom on the waves](#) is scheduled for publication in October 2008.
- Avi. [The fighting ground.](#) New York: Lippincott, 1984. [j] RL 4.2*
Thirteen-year-old Jonathan goes off to fight in the Revolutionary War and discovers the real war is being fought within himself.
- Blackwood, Gary L. [The year of the hangman.](#) New York: Dutton Children's Books, 2002. [y BLACKWOOD] RL 5.9*
In 1777, having been kidnapped and taken forcibly from England to the American colonies, fifteen-year-old Creighton becomes part of developments in the political unrest there that may spell defeat for the patriots and change the course of history.
- Boyd, James. [Drums.](#) New York: Atheneum Books for Young Readers, 1995. [j] RL 7.9*
Johnny Fraser, the son of Scottish immigrants now living in North Carolina, goes off to fight in the Revolutionary War and has adventures on both sides of the Atlantic.
- Carlson, Drew. [Attack of the Turtle.](#) Grand Rapids, Mich.: Wm. B. Eerdmans Pub., 2007. [j CARLSON] RL 4.2*
During the Revolutionary War, fourteen-year-old Nathan joins forces with his older cousin, the inventor David Bushnell, to secretly build the first submarine used in naval warfare.
- Collier, James Lincoln. [My brother Sam is dead.](#) New York: Four Winds Press, 1974. [j] RL 4.9*
Recounts the tragedy that strikes the Meeker family during the Revolution when one son joins the rebel forces while the rest of the family tries to stay neutral in a Tory town.
- Denenberg, Barry. [The journal of William Thomas Emerson, a Revolutionary War patriot.](#) New York: Scholastic, 1998. [j] RL 5.6*
William, a twelve-year-old orphan, writes of his experiences in pre-Revolutionary War Boston where he joins the cause of the patriots who are opposed to the British rule.
- Elliott, Laura. [Give me liberty.](#) New York: Katherine Tegen Books, 2006. [j ELLIOTT] Lexile 810*
Follows the life of thirteen-year-old Nathaniel Dunn, from May 1774 to December 1775, as he serves his indentureship with a music teacher in Williamsburg, Virginia, and witnesses the growing rift between patriots and loyalists, culminating in the American Revolution.

- Forbes, Esther. [Johnny Tremain](#). Boston: Houghton Mifflin Co, 1998. [j] RL 5.9*
After injuring his hand, a silversmith's apprentice in Boston becomes a messenger for the Sons of Liberty in the days before the American Revolution.
- Goodman, Joan E. [Hope's crossing](#). Boston: Houghton Mifflin, 1998. [j] RL 5.2*
When kidnapped by English Loyalists during the Revolutionary War, thirteen-year-old Hope draws on every ounce of courage within her to respond to the ordeal.
- Lavender, William. [Just Jane: A daughter of England caught in the struggle of the American Revolution](#). San Diego: Harcourt, 2002. [y LAVENDER] RL 5.3*
Fourteen-year-old Jane Prentice, orphaned daughter of an English earl, arrives in Charleston, South Carolina, in 1776 to find her family and her loyalties divided over the question of American independence.
- O'Dell, Scott. [Sarah Bishop](#). Boston: Houghton Mifflin, 1980. [j] RL 4.9*
Left alone after the deaths of her father and brother who take opposite sides in the War for Independence, and fleeing from the British who seek to arrest her, Sarah Bishop struggles to shape a new life for herself in the wilderness.
- Rinaldi, Ann. [Or give me death](#). Orlando: Harcourt, 2004. [y RINALDI] Lexile 530*
With their father away most of the time advocating independence for the American colonies, the children of Patrick Henry try to raise themselves, manage the family plantation, and care for their mentally ill mother.
- Rosenburg, John M. [First in war: George Washington in the American Revolution](#). Brookfield, Conn: Millbrook Press, 1998. [j] RL 8.0*
Chronicles George Washington's role in the American Revolution, from his appointment as commander-in-chief of the Continental Army to the British surrender at Yorktown and his famous farewell address.
